NEXT STEP 2011 STUDENT DESTINATIONS The School of Total Education



Introduction

This report is based on the findings of the Queensland Government *Next Step* survey, which targeted all students who completed Year 12 and gained a Senior Statement in 2010, whether they attended a Government, Catholic or independent school, or a TAFE secondary college. The Office of the Government Statistician conducted the survey between 4 April and 16 May 2011, approximately six months after the young people left school. Responses were predominantly collected via computer-assisted telephone interviewing with an online and paper-based survey collected from a small number of students for whom telephone details were not available.

Response rate for The School of Total Education

Table 1 below reports the response rate for The School of Total Education. It expresses the number of respondents from this school, as a percentage of all Year 12 completers attending The School of Total Education in 2010.

It has not been possible to ascertain how representative these responses are of all students at this school.

Definitions of main destinations

The pathways of Year 12 completers were categorised into ten main destinations. Respondents who were both studying and working were reported as studying for their main destination. A table defining these categories can be found in the statewide report at www.education.gld.gov.au/nextstep

Summary of findings

In 2011, two young people who completed their Year 12 at The School of Total Education in 2010 continued in some recognised form of education and training in the year after they left school.

The most common study destinations were university (one respondent) and VET Certificate I-II (one respondent). The combined VET study destinations accounted for one respondent.

There were no respondents from this school that commenced employment-based training.

In addition to the above study destinations, a further three respondents from this school deferred a tertiary offer in 2011 (deferrers are shown in Figure 1 in their current destination).

Five respondents did not enter post-school education or training, and all were employed.
